CIWM suggests making edoc mandatory

The Chartered Institution of Wastes Management (CIWM) has suggested that the UK government seriously considers making mandatory the innovative online system for recording waste transfers – edoc.

CIWM, who has been working with the edoc partners on the development and rollout of the electronic system, made the statement in its written submission to the recent Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (EFRA) Committee into waste management.

Steve Lee, Chief Executive at CIWM said, “If mandatory, edoc could provide us with much more accurate data on the waste that is being produced and help UK businesses, the waste industry and UK governments to adopt, promote and support better waste and resource management in the future. However, in order to achieve this, the majority of businesses in the UK would need to be using the system.”
